When Maggie Wilson (Junior studying Public Relations and Sustainability Leadership from Harleysville, PA) began working as the Lutheran Campus Ministry PR Intern in February 2020, no one could guess how important online communication would soon become. Only a few weeks later, Covid-19 hit and campus closed. Reaching out to students via listserv, website, social media, and Zoom became invaluable. With students dispersed to family homes across the country or scattered into their apartments in State College, Lutheran Campus Ministry's on-line presence helped create important connecting points for the student community.

For nearly two years now, Maggie has helped create posts about events and programs, weekly prayers and reflections, and information about whatever is happening with Lutheran Student Community. She's the creative mind behind the LutheranPennState presence on Instagram and Facebook, as well as much of the visual content for our website and weekly listserv.

Since the Covid-19 shutdown, Maggie says, "there has definitely been a lot more event advertising on social media and so many virtual events." Maggie uses her creativity, colorful imagery, and concise language to catch the attention of busy and overwhelmed students. "I've especially enjoyed working with quotes from students, graduating seniors, or alums who are part of LSC. It is great when I can actually tag a person, saying, 'Hey! You are special! We want to highlight you!""

Though Maggie has worked closely with campus minister Alicia Anderson, they are seldom in the same room. When campus closed in 2020, Maggie and Alicia began meeting by phone, looking together at images and PR pieces online. This system worked so well, they've continued once campus reopened. "Meeting on the phone and working virtually is very flexible and fits changing schedules,"

Spring Semester 2022, Maggie will be studying abroad at Masaryk University in Brno, Czech Republic. "I'm looking forward to meeting people from a different culture and different place, seeing how school and workplaces function in another culture, and see how they manage the work/life balance. And, of course, I am looking forward to meeting students and making friends from all over the world."

Maggie will keep creating publicity for Lutheran Campus Ministry while she studies in Europe. We are grateful that Maggie will continue to use her gifts while she is away from campus. 

I have joked that last year I only met three new students. It is a bit of an exaggeration, but not by much. Campus guidelines designed to contain the spread of illness and keep our community safe from Covid-19 restricted in-person gatherings to worship services and a few small outdoor events. Online events helped, but students were weary of online gatherings after so many classes on Zoom. Each Thursday evening, students gathered (masked and socially distanced) for worship at Pasquerilla. Nikole Hannah-Jones & 1619 Project

In preparation for the Civil Rights Pilgrimage to Alabama for Spring Break 2020, students used resources including the powerful essays and podcasts from the **1619 Project**. They were eager to hear Nikole Hannah-Jones speak on campus a few weeks later, but because of Covid, the event was delayed for more than a year. Ultimately, the in-person event in October 2021 was changed to a virtual event as the Delta variant spread and it was not possible to guarantee a large group gathering would be safe for speaker and participants.

Over 800 individuals requested pre-registration and more than 350 participated in for the virtual event. Ms. Hannah-Jones responded to questions from moderator Cheriane Stanford of WPSU. For nearly an hour, she spoke about challenges in putting the project together, the importance of engaging history in our current context, and the varied responses she has encountered from the public to the project.



Prior to the public event, Ms. Hannah-Jones met online with student leaders from Lutheran Student Community, Presbyterian Student Fellowship, Wesley PSU, Unity Christian Fellowship, and Bellisario College of Communications in a smaller event which offered the opportunity for the students to talk with Ms. Hannah-Jones more directly. The students

gathered in advance and shared dinner while they planned questions about her work as a journalist, the impact the 1619 project on her life and work, and how faith communities can work for racial justice.

In the welcome and introductions, Campus Minister Alicia Anderson shared the following: "I've been asked how campus faith groups came to initiate Nikole Hannah-Jones' time here at Penn State talking about the 1619 Project. Through time, as Africans were brought to this land against their will, religious thought has been instrumental in helping white people gain cultural and financial advantages; advocating and telling lies about people of African descent and other people of color. White people of faith must acknowledge and repent of this history, which still shapes injustice in our culture today. We have a responsibility to help educate and to work for justice. While we cannot undo the unjust history, we can work for a different future that re-

flects what our faith actually represents. Efforts like tonight will help make a different and more just future."

Both events were well-received by participants and powerful experiences. We are grateful for our many partners in hosting Nikole Hannah-Jones and the



important issues her work invites us to explore.
