And that's only part of the teachings in these chapters. Loving God with all that we are and loving our neighbors as we love ourselves is a huge task when we take it seriously. It is no wonder that Jesus' closest follow-

Interfaith Adventures—Shabbat at Hillel

In October we were invited to join with the Jewish community, Hillel at Penn State for Shabbat service and dinner in their new building on the autumn festival of Sukkot. Hosted by Rabbi Rob Glasser and an enthusiastic and welcoming group of students, we experienced worship mostly in Hebrew, shared reflections on the Torah portion, offered blessings, and enjoyed a delicious kosher taco bar.

"I have been to shabbat services before, yet this time I was struck by how much joy the students had in singing many of the prayers together, especially the ones celebrating gathering together on the sabbath," said campus minister Alicia Anderson. "Everyone was so welcoming. Since the service was in Hebrew, it was very different from our typical worship, but it also had a familiar feel."

Each Friday at sundown, Jewish people across the globe mark the beginning of the sabbath (shabbat) day of rest with prayer and a meal together. The Hillel at Penn State community opened a new building off

campus this fall and invited LSC and Wesley to visit for Sukkot, where they celebrate the autumn harvest and with rituals and prayer, remember the years the Jew-



ish people spent in the wilderness after the Exodus.

Partnership with Grace Lutheran

Grace Lutheran Church in State College is located a few blocks from campus, in the midst of off campus student housing. Its distinctive architecture has led it to called "the Dorito Church" in the community. Students who come to worship services or other congregational events find a community that is glad to see them. As in-person worship resumed in 2021, Lutheran Campus Ministry and Grace Lutheran resumed their partnership in welcoming and caring for students. As COVID-19 numbers stabilize, student meals on Sunday have returned.

This fall we are alternating lunch and dinner each week, and students are enjoying again the opportunity to eat home-cooked food and make connections with other students.
